

2007 Sexual Violence Service Providers in Virginia

Virginia has 40 Sexual Violence Service Providers providing services to all counties and cities in Virginia.

Sexual Violence Defined

The Virginia Sexual and Domestic Violence Action Alliance defines sexual violence as conduct of a sexual nature which is non-consensual, and is accomplished through threat, coercion, exploitation, deceit, force, physical or mental incapacitation, and/or power of authority.

Sexual Violence Service Providers

Sexual Violence Service Providers offer a wide array of services with the intention of responding effectively to the needs of victims of sexual violence and ultimately reducing the incidence of sexual violence in their communities.

Sexual Violence Service Providers:

- Provide 24-hour access to crisis intervention and companion services for victims of sexual violence;
- Provide confidential services to victims of sexual violence at no charge to the victim;
- Provide 24-hour access to support, information & referrals for women, men, and children who are victims of sexual violence, their family and friends, and other professionals seeking to assist them;
- Provide all services without discriminating on the basis of age, race, ethnicity, gender, religion, ability or disability, sexual orientation, gender identity, or income;
- Recognize and respond to the differing needs of diverse populations within the community and involve those diverse populations and survivors in the delivery of services;
- Promote protocols and practice throughout the community response to sexual violence to reduce the physical and psychological trauma of sexual violence and enhance recovery;
- Promote a community response that encourages the reporting of sexual violence and holds perpetrators accountable for their use of violence;
- Provide community education that raises the level of awareness of the causes and effects of sexual violence in the community, the resources available, the importance of supporting victims and holding perpetrators accountable, and the importance of working together toward a Virginia free of sexual violence.
